
We write to you on behalf of our constituents who manufacture kitchen cabinets in our districts and states to express our concern on an important trade matter that is impacting the industry. This matter pertains to the first administrative review of the antidumping duty order on *Wooden Cabinets, Vanities, and Components Thereof from China* (Case No. A-570-106).

Today, U.S. cabinet manufacturers employ over 250,000 workers with good paying jobs across the country. These companies and their employees have played a vital role in our nation's economic recovery. In recent years, cabinet manufacturers have invested millions of dollars in our communities to expand and enhance their manufacturing facilities. Such investments have proved critical, especially as we continue to turn the corner on the pandemic and work to ensure our constituents have access to meaningful economic opportunities.

On May 6, 2022, the Department of Commerce published the preliminary results of its first annual review of the antidumping duty order. It is vital to our constituents and the U.S. cabinet industry as a whole that the agency continues to examine this issue closely and use all existing trade remedy laws to their fullest extent in order to fight back against China's unfair trade practices. As such, we urge the Department to give the American Kitchen Cabinet Alliance's submission to the Department of Commerce related to the antidumping duty order on *Wooden Cabinets, Vanities, and Components Thereof from China* (Case No. A-570-106) full and fair consideration, consistent with the applicable laws and regulations.

As Members who support an open trade environment that can contribute to sustained economic growth, we also believe that trade should be conducted in a fair manner. We also know the important work the Department of Commerce is charged with to ensure U.S. companies and their employees are able to compete on a level playing field. The future of this industry and its workers rely on the trade remedy laws to be vigorously enforced, and we trust that the Department will do all possible to ensure that the industry can continue to compete now and into the future.
